The Future of the RVAA

A committee of concerned members have been studying how to restructure the RVAA to ensure the organization's future viability. Contact has been made with the New Jersey Center for Nonprofits, and present and former officers of the RVAA have been consulted.

We have looked carefully at the issues of becoming a new nonprofit, and consequently, the need for new bylaws, retaining a lawyer, and insurance—a requirement for holding meetings or exhibiting in community venues, such as libraries.

Because of our declining membership and the above complications, we are recommending the RVAA be dissolved. We believe it is the only realistic option.

In order to dissolve, any funds remaining in our bank account, currently over \$7,000, must be distributed, by law, to other nonprofit organizations. The decision has been made to divide the funds equally and donate them to the following three organizations:

Formerly, The Printmaking Center of New Jersey, Frontline Arts is focused on building communities through socially engaging arts practices rooted in papermaking and printmaking. The organization presently does transformative work with veterans, making paper from uniforms which is then used in printmaking. They offer classes in a variety of disciplines, such as bookmaking and photo lithography, and regularly hold gallery exhibits.

The History of the RVAA

In addition to the history cited below, Arthur Trippanera of Somerville was also one of the founders of the RVAA. Nina Trippanera, his daughter, was present at many of our meetings. In 1939 Mrs. Cornelius Lowe, chairperson of the Somerville Civic League art department (1939-1940), and painting instructor, Tanner Clark of Green Knoll, recognized the need for an art association in Somerset County and contacted others in the community who they thought would be interested in the endeavor.

In 1941 a meeting was conducted with at least 41 prospective members to determine how to organize the group. They agreed on a democratic format, and that the membership be comprised of professional and non-professional artists, and associates. At that meeting officers were elected, and the Somerset County Art Association was created. In 1942 the name was changed to The Raritan Valley Arts Association (RVAA) and was incorporated.

Over its long tenure, the RVAA conducted monthly meetings, September through May, highlighted by demonstrations by local artists and the RVAA's own talented members. The organization offered many opportunities for its members, including an annual Holiday Art Show and Sale, exhibits in the county's public buildings, and informal "member show-andtell" at some meetings. The RVAA also organized a yearly excursion to visit the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the American Watercolor Society's Annual Exhibit at the Salmagundi Club.

During its decades of operation, many artists found inspiration and camaraderie as members of the Raritan Valley Arts Association.
